#### IS CHARLIE CHAN A RACIST STEREOTYPE?

**Merriam-Webster**: racist (noun) a person who is racist: someone who holds the belief that race is a fundamental determinant of human traits and capacities and that racial differences produce an inherent superiority of a particular race.

**Cambridge Dictionary**: racist (noun) someone who believes that their race makes them better, more intelligent, more moral, etc. than people of other races and who does or says unfair or harmful things as a result.

**Oxford Learners Dictionary**: racist (adjective) having the belief that some races of people are better than others or having general beliefs about other people based only on their race; showing this through violent or unfair treatment of people of other races.

With the exception of instances of the growing self-delusive plague of modern-day newspeak, the traditional definitions of "racism" seen above point to anything but the intent of the Charlie Chan film series. Any honest, unbiased appraisal of the movies in that series, which ran from 1931 to 1949, will see immediately that the term "racist" does not apply. Again, outside of mob-induced disdain, if not outright hatred, of the type brewed within the intellectual safety of a college film history class where a fair viewing of a Charlie Chan movie would be a virtual impossibility, a fair appraisal of any of the Charlie Chan films will prove to any free-thinking individual that the intended portrayal of Chinese detective Charlie Chan was, in no way "racist."

The more Charlie Chan movies that one views, the more one can readily see how deftly Chan handles those who seek to belittle him or his abilities as a detective. Whether it's the ignorance of a gruff cop or a negative comment by a dubious individual, Charlie Chan is shown to be above such things, always prevailing in the end, and usually winning over the person or person in the end. And, isn't that the best way to fight actual racism and ignorance? Charlie Chan teaches us how.

By the early 1980s, the criticism of Charlie Chan grew due to the fact that the Chinese detective was, with the exception of the few earliest on-screen portrayals of the character in silent movies and one early talkie in which Chan had limited dialogue and but a few minutes of screen time, portrayed by actors of European heritage. However, there was no thought as to which actor of Chinese or other Asian lineage during the era of the 1930s or '40s could successfully bring Charlie Chan to life on the big screen.

But, let's allow Keye Luke, who played Charlie Chan's Number One Son alongside Warner Oland's Charlie Chan, to share his opinion on this subject, as he stated during an interview given to Canadian television (TV Ontario) around the year 1985:

**INTERVIEWER**: "How did you feel – Some people get worried today about the fact that a Swede played an Oriental, or a Hungarian – Peter Lorre – played Mr. Moto; they call this racism."

KEYE LUKE: "Aw!"

INTERVIEWER: "But, where does Keye Luke stand on that?"

**KEYE LUKE**: "Well, I call it artistry. I think that regardless of race, color, background, so on – if a man can create a character which you can believe, he is an artist and is entitled to the distinction of artistry,

and I don't think race has a thing to do about it. Furthermore, at that time there were no Orientals around that could have possibly played that part, for one thing. They might have some today, but I don't know of any – that is, those that fit the Chan image – you know, that portly, genial sort of character."

**INTERVIEWER**: "Yes, because he did – he was more than just the detective. He was the whole presence, wasn't he? He required a persona."

**KEYE LUKE**: "He was the type of actor who could obliterate his own personality and create a believable character right before your eyes. Of course, I had the great good fortune to work with him, and I observed how he worked. He was so thorough. If you watch him, he's as smooth as skating on ice. Never a break in there – one thing flowed into another. The words matched the looks, the looks matched the words, and the actions matched everything. He was amazing." (Ft note 1)

Today, of course, this would not be a problem, except for the sad reality that so much politically correct hatred with the resulting "bad press" that has been projected onto the character so that this would be a tough undertaking at best.

**Merriam-Webster**: stereotype (noun) something conforming to a fixed or general pattern. especially: a standardized mental picture that is held in common by members of a group and that represents an oversimplified opinion, prejudiced attitude, or uncritical judgment.

**Cambridge Dictionary**: stereotype (noun) a set idea that people have about what someone or something is like, especially an idea that is wrong.

**Oxford Learners Dictionary**: stereotype (noun) a fixed idea or image that many people have of a particular type of person or thing, but which is often not true in reality and may cause hurt and offence.

So, is Charlie Chan a stereotype? Again, we must look back into history and examine what the predominant culture was like in America during the 1930s and '40s when Charlie Chan was dominant among "B" movie detectives. When we look through the window of the popular media of the day, we can see that Charlie Chan did not fit the contemporary preconceptions regarding Chinese. In fact, we can again point to how Chan was able to overcome any preconceptions or prejudices that he encountered. And were these prejudices portrayed in a good light? Of course not. As stated above, Charlie Chan quickly and effectively overcame any such negativity.

We see in a number of instances how Charlie Chan's offspring are thoroughly Americanized, and while their famous father still holds to many of the ways of the culture of his birth, in that, is he any different from all of the other ethnic groups who immigrated to the United States? This is a part of the American experience.

In reality, Charlie Chan was an anti-stereotype. He served to overcome many preconceptions that were present during the earlier decades of the 20th Century. Is it not ironic how some critics of Charlie Chan are upset by his acting too "white" or "subservient"? Do these critics not reveal that they themselves hold their own stereotypical views in how a Chinese man should act? It is a mistake to take humility for subservience or weakness. It takes great inner strength to radiate humility, especially during times of trial.

Two Chan "sons" put things into perspective during a 1977 interview:

**BENSON FONG**: "I really felt fortunate that during those years we enjoyed parts where we could speak English and not make with the accents. It was more fun to be able to speak your own language in films, and I think the Chan pictures were the only films where we were able to play ourselves."

**KEYE LUKE**: "I felt the Chan pictures were a credit to the Chinese people. Before this only menacing pictures of Chinatown were shown – opium dens, slave girls, hatchet men, climaxed by the arch-villain Fu Manchu. Charlie Chan came along and erased that image and spread throughout the world a much better picture of the Chinese. Granted it was entertainment, but the public takes the screen portrayal as the real thing, especially when it was done as convincingly as Warner Oland did it. I think that he created a better image for the Orientals, and that his "sons" helped him in that way. You can see that Charlie Chan was wise, sensitive, cautious, honest, gracious, courteous and compassionate. No one ever out-foxed him. He triumphed over everybody and everything. He was the number one man from beginning to end, and I think that did a great deal to erase the image of Fu Manchu." (ft note 2)

Charlie Chan was portrayed on the radio, and later, television, by various actors in ways very similar to his film portrayals. These forms of media were another way that the public was able to enjoy the detective's adventures. Chan also appeared in visual print media including newspaper comics and comic books. There were even Charlie Chan board and card games that were produced in the 1930s. These additional popular manifestations of "Chanmania" would not have arisen if Charlie Chan had been a racially demeaning character or a mere stereotype.

Individuals or groups seeking to cast aspersions on what was innocently produced in the past as non-demeaning, and, in fact, a positive promotion of a positive Chinese character, indeed a hero, during an era where that was a breakthrough. These individuals or groups should, perhaps, take note of history's ultimate disdain for the forces who have sought to remove through force that which they disagreed or found objectionable due to their histophobia. We witnessed this vividly in 2003 when Fox Movie Channel bowed to organized pressure groups, pulling the plug on a proposed Charlie Chan movie marathon.

Audiences back in the day did not pay their hard-earned money to see a "racist" negative "stereotype" appear on screen. Movie-goers wanted to be entertained, and that's just what they got through the exploits of Charlie Chan, who, as a result, became a worldwide personality with his movies thrilling and enchanting audiences in numerous countries, including China, for many years. It is humbly suggested that, before picking up any stones, that one please carefully delve into the actual facts before casting same.



#### HOPING FOR AN ENCORE (APRIL 2024) AT THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA: CHARLIE CHAN AND

FRIENDS. Fingers & toes are crossed for a return of this class which focuses on the 1930s–1950s "oriental" detective films of Charlie Chan, Mr. Moto, and other "friends of the East"; some of the most successful film series of their period. The Chan series ran for over twenty years against a background of American fascination, cultural appropriation, mixed feelings and changing values with regard to the "inscrutable Orient." The class will explore how popular media reflect the cultural constructs and tensions of their times through the lens of Charlie and his onscreen compatriots. Film clips and discussion. The 6-week course seats 50 eager sleuths. INSTRUCTOR: Len Freeman, longtime film critic, poet, and cowboy B movies/serials buff.

HAPPY NEW YEAR DRAGONS! While our Roman calendar New Year's began on January 1st, not so with the Lunar New Year and Chinese zodiac! Year 2024 ushers in THE YEAR OF THE DRAGON, which begins February 10, 2024 and runs through January 28, 2025. Past DRAGON Years are: 1928, 1940, 1952, 1964, 1976, 1964, 1988, 2000, and 2012. If you were born in one of those years, your Chinese zodiac chances are you are probably a DRAGON. Other DRAGONS include: Joan of Arc, Boris Johnson, Julius Caesar, Adele, Bruce Lee, Liam Neeson, Jack Dorsey, Ringo Star and...Lou Armagno.

The DRAGON happens to be the "fifth" of twelve animals of the Chinese zodiac. According to myth, the Jade Emperor called all animals of the universe together for a race. He decreed the first 12 animals to finish would be rewarded with a year dedicated in their honor, and according to the order in which they arrived. The sly Rat was the first to arrive. He rode upon the back of the water buffalo (OX), and when they got to their destination, rat jumped off to finish first! Then, Ox, Tiger, Rabbit, Dragon, Snake, Horse, Goat, Monkey, Rooster, Dog and Pig arrived in that order. The calendar repeats every 12 years. Among the Chinese zodiac animals, the dragon is the sole imaginary animal. The Chinese dragon is the most vital and powerful beast in the Chinese zodiac, although Dragons have an infamous reputation for being a hothead and possessing a sharp tongue. Gifted with innate courage, tenacity, and intelligence, Dragons are enthusiastic and confident. They are not afraid of challenges, and are willing to take risks.



# Things that Dragons should avoid:

Unlucky colors: blue, green

Unlucky numbers: 3 and 8

Unlucky direction: northwest

Unlucky months: the 5th and 6th Chinese lunar months

**Which Type of 'Dragon' Are You?** In Chinese element theory, each zodiac sign is associated with one of five elements: <u>Gold (Metal)</u>, <u>Wood</u>, <u>Water</u>, <u>Fire</u>, <u>or Earth</u>, which means that a Wood Dragon, for example, comes once in a 60-year cycle.

Oland whom participated in the "Charlie Chan is Missing" documentary on Oland for the 20th Century-Fox set of DVDs released during the latter half of the 2000s.
